Our Science curriculum aims to ensure that all pupils: develop scientific knowledge and conceptual understanding through the specific disciplines of biology, chemistry and physics • develop understanding of the nature, processes and methods of science through different types of science enquiries that help them to answer scientific questions about the world around them • are equipped with the scientific knowledge required to understand the uses and implications of science, today and for the future We recognise the importance of science in every aspect of daily life. We therefore make links to real life situations, celebrate diverse and influential scientists, and provide exciting opportunities for children to investigate and learn from firsthand experiences. Our core values in science are endurance, respect, and courage. IMPLEMENTATION - Scientific knowledge, understanding and enquiry skills are embedded in each topic the children study. These topics are revisited and developed throughout their time at school. We ensure all children develop an understanding of the world around them, whilst acquiring specific skills and knowledge, to help them think scientifically.

IMPACT – Children demonstrate sound scientific knowledge, skills and understanding of the concepts studied. They are inquisitive and articulate, and can apply their scientific knowledge to describe and understand the world and processes

- describe magnets as having two poles
- predict whether two magnets will attract or repel each other, depending on which poles are facing

Plants

- explore the requirements of plants for life and growth (air, light, water, nutrients from soil, and room to grow) and how they vary from plant to plant
- investigate the way in which water is transported within plants
- explore the part that flowers play in the life cycle of flowering plants, including pollination, seed formation and seed dispersal

Properties & changes of materials

- compare and group together everyday materials on the basis of their properties, including their hardness, solubility, transparency, conductivity (electrical and thermal), and response to magnets
- know that some materials will dissolve in liquid to form a solution, and describe how to recover a substance from a solution
- use knowledge of solids, liquids and gases to decide how mixtures might be separated, including through filtering, sieving and evaporating
- give reasons, based on evidence from comparative and fair tests, for the particular uses of everyday materials, including metals, wood and plastic
- demonstrate that dissolving, mixing and changes of state are reversible changes
- explain that some changes result in the formation of new materials, and that this kind of change is not usually reversible, including changes associated with burning and the action of acid on bicarbonate of soda

Theme = LET'S GET MOVING Forces

- explain that unsupported objects fall towards the Earth because of the force of gravity acting between the Earth and the falling object
- identify the effects of air resistance, water resistance and friction, that act between moving surfaces
- recognise that some mechanisms, including levers, pulleys and gears, allow a smaller force to have a greater effect
